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NCFAA CONTRIBUTIONS TO COLLEGE FOOTBALL AWARD

The National College Football Awards Association created the **Contributions to College Football Award** to recognize exceptional contributions to the sport. The award is presented to an individual who has been closely associated with college football as a player, coach, administrator, media personality or other position attendant to the game.

Five legendary coaches from Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU) were honored in 2018: Rod Broadway, the only coach to win a black college national championship at three different schools — North Carolina A&T, Grambling and North Carolina Central; Marino "The Godfather" Casem, who won seven SWAC Championships as head coach at Alcorn State; Archie "The Gunslinger" Cooley, head coach at Mississippi Valley State, Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Norfolk State, and Paul Quinn and inducted into the SWAC Hall of Fame in 2007; Bill Hayes, the winningest coach at Winston-Salem State and North Carolina A&T; and Willie Jeffries, head coach at South Carolina State, Wichita State and Howard and the first African-American head coach of a Division I-A program at a predominately white school.

Criteria

The Biletnikoff Award candidate must be an active collegiate receiver (any player who receives a pass, regardless of position) at an NCAA Division I FBS school; he must not have been declared ineligible to participate by the NCAA or the candidate's school at the time of any vote of the national selection committee; he must display leadership and self-discipline and have a significant, positive impact on his team's success; and he must display a commitment always to play at his best. All-SEC (1998), Football News First Team All-American in 1998, and the first All-American from the University of Arkansas in a decade. His success was not limited to the gridiron. He was also named to the All-SEC Academic Honor Roll every year from 1995-98, and was the first football player in the entire history of his university to earn a Masters degree "before" playing his last game.

Brandon was selected by the Indianapolis Colts as the 63rd overall pick in the 1999 NFL draft. After minicamp, he was projected by his coaches to start as a rookie. Unfortunately, Brandon was tragically killed in a head-on automobile collision just 11 days after the draft.

A distinguished selection committee made up of former players and coaches votes on athletes that are nominated from their FBS schools.

The University of Arkansas has an endowment in Burlsworth's name. Multiple \$5,000 academic scholarships, and one \$10,000 walk-on athletic scholarship are awarded each year. The Brandon Burlsworth Foundation is engaged in various charitable endeavors including hosting underprivileged children at Arkansas Razorbacks and Indianapolis Colts games. The foundation also provides free eye exams and glasses to over one thousand less fortunate children each year. In 2010, the Burlsworth Trophy was created to honor the achievements and successes of the Walk-On athlete.

Dick Butkus, the former University of Illinois and Chicago Bears Hall of Fame linebacker who won NFL Rookie of the Year honors, was named to seven NFL All-Pro teams and played in eight consecutive Pro Bowls during his nine-year professional career.

Voting Procedures

The Butkus Award is selected by a panel of 51 selectors. In addition to the collegiate trophy winner, selectors also choose a professional and high school trophy winner. Individual votes are kept confidential.

Criteria

Selectors choose the best overall linebacker, with primary consideration given to performance on the field and the athlete's overall character. Selection criteria and selectors are posted on the award website.

Davey O'Brien led the TCU Horned Frogs to an undefeated season in 1938 and their second National Championship. He was the first player to win the Heisman Trophy, Maxwell Award and Walter Camp Award in the same year. O'Brien played for the Philadelphia Eagles before retiring to pursue a career in the FBI. He is a member of the College Football Hall of Fame.

Voting Procedures

The Davey O'Brien Award is voted on by its National Selection Committee, which is composed of journalists, broadcasters, reporters and commentators from across the country, as well as former winners. The committee votes three times throughout the season, narrowing the field of candidates to semifinalists, finalists and finally the winner.

Criteria

Quarterbacks from all 130 Division I FBS schools are eligible until the field is narrowed to 16 semifinalists. The selection committee is asked to evaluate candidates on the basis of quarterback skills/athletic ability, academics, reputation as a team player, character, leadership and sportsmanship.

Each year, the Davey O'Brien Foundation recognizes student-athletes for their achievements both on and off the field. 
The mission of the Paul Hornung Award is to recognize and reward versatile, high-level performers in major college football (Football Bowl Subdivision team members); to help preserve the legacy of one of Louisville's native sons and sports icons; and to promote Louisville as a great sports town. A panel of college football experts creates a watch list of approximately 50 players. Additionally, Louisville Sports Commission staff and outside experts select and recognize outstanding performers each week during the course of the season. After Week 11 of the regular season, a panel of college football experts creates a candidate list of approximately 10-15 players based on performance during the season. The Paul Hornung Award Selection Committee chooses the finalists and ultimately the winner from the candidate list. For the actual selection, a 17-member Selection Committee votes for finalists in mid-November. Fan voting powered by Texas Roadhouse accounts for the 18th vote. The Selection Committee chooses the winner in early December from among the finalists after they compete in bowl games.

Dave Rimington, the only two-time winner of the Outland Trophy (1981 and '82) and considered by many as the best college lineman of all time. Rimington was also the 1982 Lombardi Award winner, a two-time All-American, and is a member of the College Football Hall of Fame. Rimington went on to play seven years in the NFL with the Cincinnati Bengals and Philadelphia Eagles from 1983-90. He currently serves as President of the Boomer Esiason Foundation which raises money for the fight against cystic fibrosis.

While more than a dozen All-America teams are selected annually, the Rimington Trophy committee uses these three prestigious teams to determine a winner: Walter Camp Football Foundation, Sporting News, and Football Writers Association of America.

Because the selectors of these three All-America teams can place centers in a "mix" of offensive linemen that includes guards and tackles, their 11-man first teams can often have two centers. The Rimington Trophy committee's policy is to count all players that play primarily the center position for their respective teams as centers, even though they may be listed as guards or tackles on the four All-America teams.

The center with the most first team votes will be determined the winner. If there is a tie with first team votes, then the center with the most second team votes will win. If there is still a tie, the winner will be determined by a majority vote from the Rimington Trophy committee.

Additional Information

All proceeds from the Rimington Trophy aid in the fight against cystic fibrosis. To date, the Rimington Trophy has raised over \$4.2 million for the cystic fibrosis community. In addition to the award for the most outstanding center at the Division I FBS level, the Rimington Trophy committee also recognizes the top centers from Division I FCS, Division II, Division III and the NAIA. In 2005, the Rimington Trophy presented the inaugural President Gerald R. Ford Legends Award, which recognizes former college or pro football centers who have achieved excellence in the football community or through philanthropic or business endeavors.

Uplifting Athletes is a nonprofit organization that inspires the rare disease community with hope through the power of sport. Our national network of chapters is run by current football student-athletes.

What makes Uplifting Athletes unique is that our chapter network is run by current football student-athletes, providing them with an opportunity to gain practical job skills while learning how to leverage their assets and abilities to make a positive and lasting impact.

A rare disease is one that affects fewer than 200,000 Americans and consequently lacks financial incentive to make and market new treatments. Each chapter adopts one out of approximately 7,000 rare diseases (such as MS, ALS, cystic fibrosis, pancreatic cancer, etc.) – giving the football student-athletes an opportunity to make the cause relevant to them. We currently have chapters at 25 different universities.

The success of this initial effort, college football's lack of a cause-marketing relationship and the overwhelming needs of the rare disease community has led to the evolution of Uplifting Athletes.
